Once again, we've made improvements in our compliance against the Gatsby Benchmarks, which is the nationally recognised marker to ensure that we are providing high quality careers education. The Gatsby Foundation recently reviewed careers education provision nationally and has released a report so we will be making further improvements to our careers service based on the recommendations from this report. One of our targets is to link careers to curriculum learning. This term in preparation for their GCSE science exams, some of our students have been conducting experiments. These include investigating enzyme activity, exploring the process of photosynthesis, and comparing how different concentrations of sugars and salts affect osmosis in potato cells. It was a great opportunity for students to work together to conduct the tests and make predictions about the results. Many careers in the health industry begin with an enjoyment and interest in science. We take great pride in encouraging our students to be hands on learners and develop curiosity.

For National Volunteering Day this term some of our students have been staying fit and active while volunteering in the local community. Micronutrients

One of our Year 11 students has been learning about the role of micronutrients in keeping the body fit and healthy during his food tech class. Micronutrients like vitamins and minerals help the body function properly—for example, vitamin C from red peppers boosts the immune system, and iron helps transport oxygen around the body. His one-pot pasta dish with red peppers, basil, and other nutritious ingredients looks both delicious and healthy!

Understanding nutrition isn't just useful for making tasty meals—it can also lead to careers in healthcare. Dietitians, nutritionists, and healthcare assistants all use knowledge about food and health to help people live better lives. Learning how food affects the body could even spark an interest in studying sports science, medicine, or public health in the future.

Now, obviously, we were not going to just let Hazel go without giving us all the benefit of her years of experience. We asked Hazel some questions about her careers journey and more. Here is what she said:

Tell us a bit about your careers journey and how it has progressed or changed across the years.

I left school after A levels and was unemployed for a while. I worked for a few months as a lab assistant in a uni. I then trained as a nurse, qualifying but realising that I didn't want to work shifts forever and returned to FE college to do more A levels. After this I went to uni to do a degree in psychology, still not sure what I was going to do full time. After that I did a PGCE and worked as a primary school teacher then left that to work in the special needs department of the local council.

Did you go to university and if so, was this useful to you?

Yes, I did, for my degree, then PGCE then to do a course on teaching children whose first language isn't English and started an M Ed. I switched courses after I started working for a national company who worked with children in care and those excluded from school. I then returned to the open university to complete a Master's degree in Business Administration.

Do you have any regrets about your career's choices?

No, I have loved my working life overall. I am now retiring so I can pursue my love of art.

What did careers advice look like when you were in secondary school? What support did you get?

LOL. I was told that, as I could type I should be a secretary. When I suggested that I might like to be an architect they laughed. Things were very different back then.

You have owned your own business for many years, what are the positives and negatives of being your own boss?

The positives are that I have got to work with extremely caring and talented adults and some incredible young people. I was also able to demonstrate that respect is the key to helping young people to achieve and grow in confidence.

The downside is the constant pressure and employing people!! It increases the workload hugely.

What careers or general advice would "older Hazel" give to your younger self with the benefit of hindsight?

I would advise myself that I can achieve anything I set my mind to and not to accept barriers put in the way by others. Also, that once a choice is made it doesn't have to be forever. You can always retrain and achieve your goals through working hard and challenging yourself.

What are you going to do with all your spare time in retirement? What's next? ART!! This would have been my second choice... In fact I had just got a place on an art foundation course when I got the job as a trainee nurse. I am now going to fill my time being creative, learning more skills, challenging myself to improve. Oh and swimming, kayaking and much travelling.
